

## Morris County Children's Home, 1882-1974

The Morris County Children's Home was incorporated December 6, 1881, by the Morris County Charities Aid Association. The Home was begun to remove pauper children, ages 3-16, from the nearby County Alms House, where they had been lodged with adults. The facility operated until 1929, at which point placement with foster families became the preferred social norm. Narratives of the day describe it as the first program of its kind.

By 1933 the few remaining children in care were housed on Mt Kemble Avenue and the program oversight handled from the offices of Family Services of Morris County, Park Place, both in Morristown.

The building in Hanover/Parsippany\* subsequently served the National Youth Administration (NYA), Alcoholics Anonymous and as a home for the elderly. It was an empty, condemned structure when it burned down October 30, 1959. The small cemetery in which some Home residents were buried was "rediscovered" and restored by the community in the 1960s. The "Little Lost Cemetery", as it is known, is currently maintained by Fire District #6, Parsippany, on whose property the plot is found.

The Morris County Children's Home finally dissolved in the early 1970s, under the leadership of their last chairman, Rev. Thomas S. Mutch (Rector, Presbyterian Church, Morristown, 1936-1966).

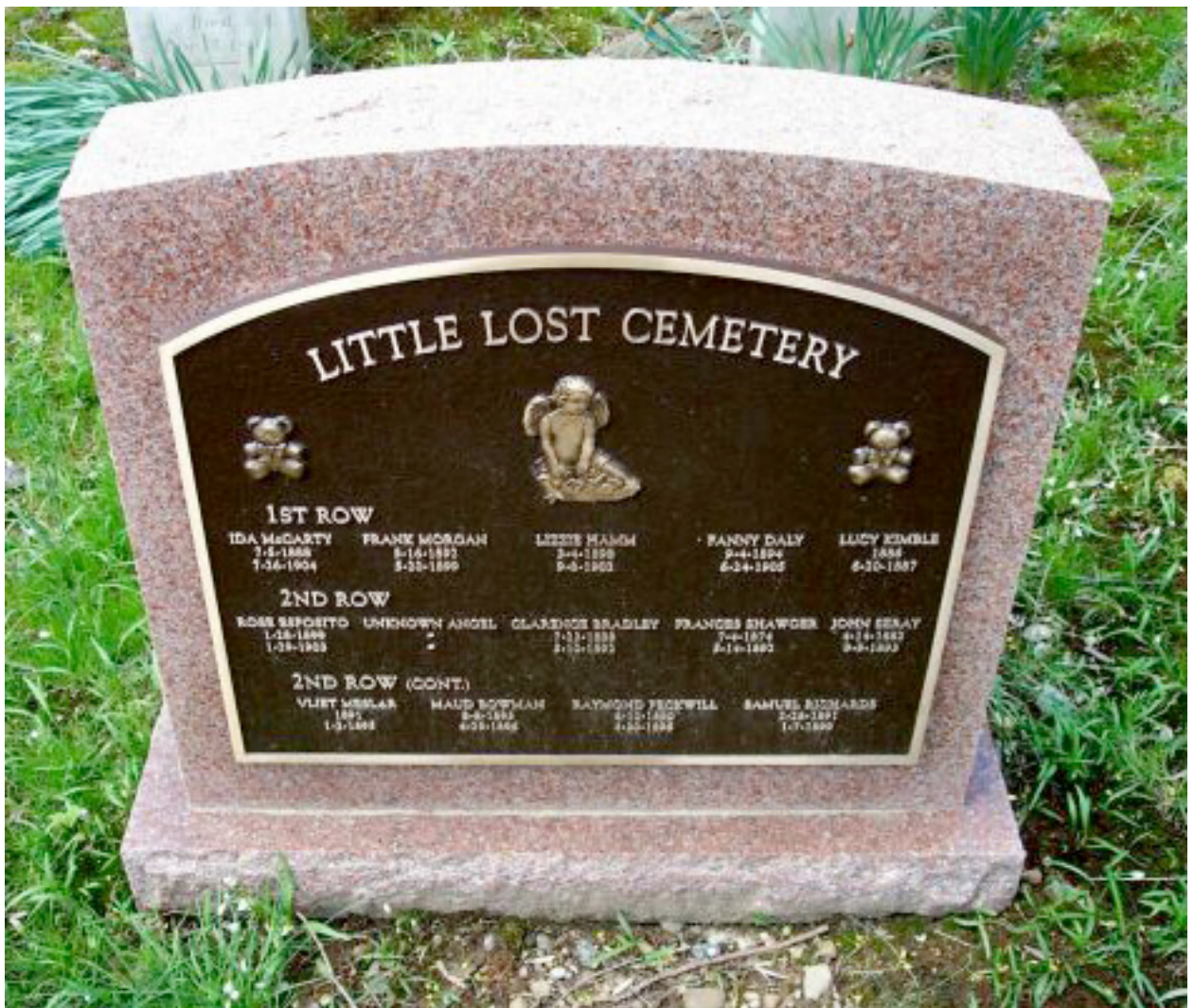

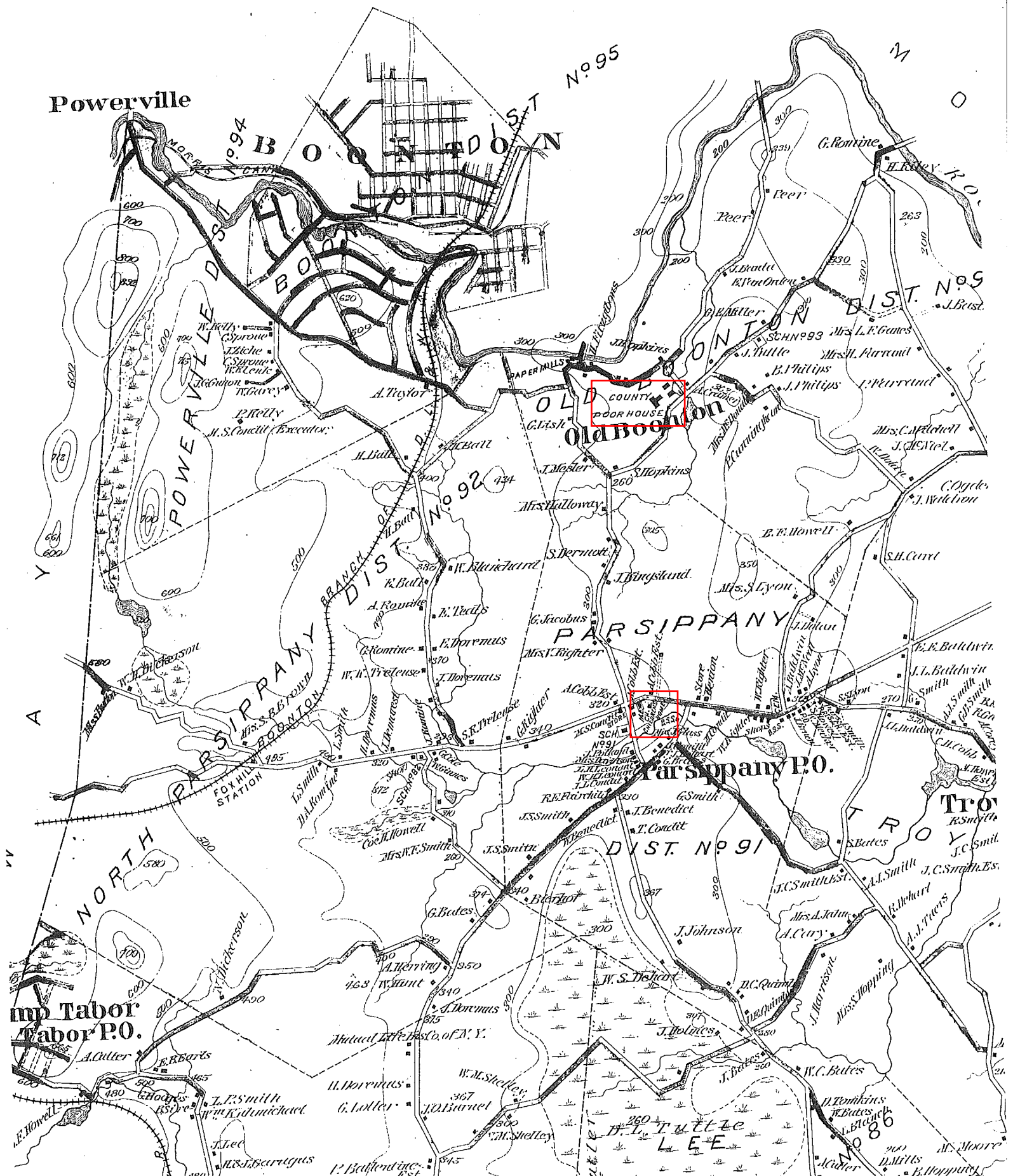
Two statements in the (Parsippany) Historic Site Survey, site 1458-129, about the Children's Home, cannot be confirmed.

1) There is no evidence of a scarlet fever epidemic in Hanover in 1883. Rockaway Twp (mining community) had 16 child deaths that year, scarlet fever. Deaths in Hanover are due to croup and diphtheria.

2) NJ State Library (Deborah Mercer) finds no evidence of a state order to close the Children's Home, ca 1928-1929, in reports of the NJ Dept of Institutions and Agencies, 1923-1933. Quite the reverse:

"The Morris County Children's Home near Boonton is organized in accordance with modern methods of child care, with a trained social worker as the executive and with a field worker who is trained for service in child care and placement." (p.26)

## MORRIS COUNTY GRAVESTONES

## "Little Lost Cemetery"

THE "LITTLE LOST CEMETERY" is located in Parsippany-Troy Hills Township directly behind the District #6 firehouse, which is at the northeast intersection of Littleton Road and Interstate Highway 287. The existence of this small burial place, of about 20 by 30 feet, was virtually unknown to township residents until recent years, when the I-287 right-of-way threatened its removal. Today the cemetery is protected by a concrete retaining wall as north-bound traffic speeds by barely fifty feet away.

Mrs. Frances V. Kaminski, of the Parsippany-Troy Hills Historical Sites Preservation Committee, states that the cemetery served the Morris County Children's Home. The home was an outgrowth of the old Boonton Almshouse, now submerged under the Jersey City Reservoir. The 22 children in the almshouse in 1882 were removed in that year to a colonial frame mansion, known as Ailanthus Hall, near the present cemetery site and interments were made in this burial plot over the years. In addition to the 14 marked graves, one of which has only a crude fieldstone marker, it is possible that other children were buried here. In particular, it is rumored that during the influenza epidemic of World War I a number of children were hurriedly buried without the benefit of gravestones. In 1929 the policy of placing children in foster homes brought on the closing of Ailanthus Hall. The mansion mysteriously burned down in the early 1950's, leaving but few to remember the burials. Recently the Historical Sites Committee has maintained the cemetery, and erected a sign for the "Little Lost Cemetery."

During her research Mrs. Kaminski has determined that James Bowman was the father of Maud, and that Andrew Shawger was the father of Frances. The inscriptions, copied earlier by Mrs. Kaminski, were checked by Edward J. Raser on October 28, 1973.
